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Margao: A National Symposium on Digital Humanities: Perspectives and Challenges, first of its kind in India organised by any university is being hosted at the Goa Campus of BITS Pilani by the Department of Humanities and Social Sciences on Friday, September 9 between 9:30 am and 5:30 pm.

The symposium will be held at the K K Birla Goa Campus, LC 101.

Digital Humanities or DH is a domain of study that embraces all those techniques and methodologies such as image processing, network analysis, data visualization, etc., drawn from computer science to understand and approach humanities texts. In other words, DH provides an intellectual, innovative and creative fusion between the two disciplines of computer science and humanistic

studies.

The event aims to bring together scholars, writers, and artists from across India to discuss the role of Digital Humanities in Indian higher education.

It features seasoned academicians and artists undertaking Digital Humanities projects in a higher education context : Professors Supriya and Sukanta Chaudhuri from Jadavpur University, Professor Venkat Rao of EFLU, Dr. Padmini Ray Murray of Srishti University, and Orijit Sen, Mario Miranda Chair visiting professor, Goa University.
